National Church Awards 2024

In 2024 the National Church Awards have been inspired by the work and legacy of Lord Patrick Cormack, a champion of church buildings, who dedicated his life to helping to keep them open and in use.

He was a Trustee of the Historic Churches Preservation Trust from 1972-2004, our youngest ever Trustee. He remained a Vice President of the National Churches Trust until his death in 2024. He was also an active member of the Society for the Preservation of Ancient Buildings, Lincolnshire Churches Trust, the Council for British Archaeology, the Historic Buildings Council, Heritage in Danger, and a member of the Royal Commission on Historical Manuscripts.

He was a member of the Church of England, Rector's Warden and 'Parliamentary Warden' of St Margaret Westminster, and churchwarden at St Mary Enville, and from 2018 until his death he was Deputy High Steward of Lincoln Cathedral.

Lord Cormack was one of Britain's longest-serving parliamentarians, with a combined total of fifty-four years in the Palace of Westminster. Through his time in the Houses of Commons and Lords he campaigned and spoke out for churches.

Church & Community Volunteers Awards

Churches are so much more than just places of worship. From foodbanks to credit unions, churches across the UK provide a growing list of essential services for people in urgent need. We've long seen the power of churches to bring communities together and help them thrive.

The volunteer awards centre around the brilliant contribution that volunteers make to both caring for and making best use of churches, and especially using churches to reach out to local communities and using the building as a hub for activity. They celebrate that often, finding a wider community use for a church, chapel or meeting house, can make it a thriving and busy building. Activities and engagement can help stimulate community or grant funding support for repair and conservation projects, and those in turn help to maintain suitable space for even more activities.

Volunteers from any church, chapel or meeting house can be nominated for these awards. We want to celebrate the geographic spread of the great work that exists in caring for churches across the UK.

You just need to be able to tell us about the people involved, the fantastic things you do and the difference that it makes. Your nomination will be reviewed by an expert panel.

We will award one winner in each of the four UK nations.

- Submit your nomination by Saturday 31 August 2024
- We will be announcing the results at the National Church Awards ceremony at Lincoln Cathedral on Tuesday 22 October 2024

Church of the Year

The Church of the Year award is the pinnacle award at the National Church Awards that celebrates a church that fulfils its potential and makes a mark on its community and beyond. It should be a shining example of a sustainable church – one that is relevant, looked after, in good repair, in use and open for all.

We realise it's sometimes hard to raise yourself up and say that what you do is wonderful. But, churches, chapels and meeting houses across the UK do brilliant things, and using 'Church of the Year' helps us to shed light on that.

Vibrant and valued churches are open for worship and well supported, have an effective team that cares for them and engage well with volunteers. They offer a warm welcome to visitors, offer great spaces for community activities, and tell their stories in brilliant ways. This is what makes churches sustainable. You might not be there yet, but we want to hear how you are doing.

The winner for our Church of the Year is chosen from the winners of the other categories at the event. The judging panel will review your submission to the other categories in order to decide a winner.
